Your sons will have seen the following words in every classroom this term:

- It takes **COURAGE** to accept OWNERSHIP of your own success
- It takes **COURAGE** to MOTIVATE yourself to aim high
- It takes **COURAGE** to find RESILIENCE to bounce back from setbacks
- It takes **COURAGE** to try something INNOVATIVE and risk failing

Brave students try something new, make mistakes and progress because of this.

Encourage Courage from Home.

The relationship between the two words is fascinating. Both have their etymological root in the Latin word *cor* meaning *heart* so we are not looking for daredevil action so much as inner strength.

Small changes yield significant gains. So, encourage your quiet son to put up his hand and just have a go; remind your reluctant son to take a risk and try a new way of doing something; reassure your self-conscious son it is okay to admit to being confused. At school, we will aim to provide a supportive place where speaking openly and honestly about our struggles is possible – even for teenage boys protecting a fragile outer bravado.

"Courage is not a man with a gun in his hand."

With these words, literary legend, Atticus, in *To Kill a Mockingbird* points his children towards a different kind of courage, a moral courage which asks them to acknowledge that it is starting and finishing something which counts, even if - or particularly if – you know you are going to lose in the end. Hopefully, our exam students about to embark on study leave, are confident that success, not failure, is on the horizon but progress towards this success will be made more smoothly if we can encourage them to practise the art – or rather the *heart* - of courage.
