



### **Swimming Successes**

Congratulations to our Caretaker, Martin Giddings. After 30 years of looking after our swimming pool, he has won a well-deserved award from Pool Mark. We are the only school in the country to have been awarded this accreditation so a huge well done & thank you to Martin!







The Secondary Schools **Team Relay** Championships is the longest running championship series organised by the English **Schools Swimming** Association (ESSA). It is open to secondary school aged swimmers from across England, including state, public and home-schooled students. Teams compete in 4x50m Freestyle and Medley relays.

The Championships is run as a national final with competing schools determined by the fastest times achieved in a qualifying round organised by the ESSA divisions.



Following those regional events earlier this term, our Senior and Inters teams moved on to the National Finals. The Juniors gave it their all in the regional gala but sadly did not quite make the cut – A great experience for the squad though and I'm sure they'll come back stronger for another attempt next year.

At the National Finals there were some fantastic performances on the day. The Seniors managed 12<sup>th</sup> place in the Medley relay and the Inters were placed 19<sup>th</sup> in the Medley relay and 20<sup>th</sup> in the Freestyle relay. A really strong showing from both squads – Well done to all!









On the eleventh hour on the eleventh day of the eleventh month, the entire school community came together to remember all those who have given their lives to protect our freedom. As ever, our students demonstrated exceptional respect during our service. In their first term, the group have been very busy indeed immersing themselves in Latin American culture:


Making piñatas (pictured)

### Some highlights:

- Staff are highly aspirational and hugely invested in the school. Relationships are very strong, and students and staff feel listened to and valued. Students told reviewers how much they enjoy school, and they feel extremely well supported by the staff. One student said: 'We can always rely on them'
- The school is very inclusive. Everybody gets on well together. There is a real acceptance and celebration of the increasingly diverse school community
- Students are proud of their school. Attendance is high, reflecting their thirst to succeed. The culture for learning is excellent. Learning explorations and student discussions show that they are making very strong progress through the curriculum
- The positive, disciplined climate for learning is the bedrock of the school's success. The warm and
  respectful relationships between teachers and students and between students themselves are testament to
  the hard work and team spirit of all the staff who have developed an excellent learning environment
- A constant and relentless drive on professional development is central to the school's continuing upward trajectory. A menu of training opportunities is provided to meet the needs and aspirations of all staff members, resulting in a highly skilled and ambitious workforce who relish the opportunities they are offered to take on leadership roles
- Students are eager learners and therefore their behaviour in class is exemplary
- Students expect to be challenged. They are ambitious for their futures and aim for the very highest grades.
   Sixth form students gain the grades they need for their next steps, with most going onto university or degree apprenticeships

Contributions can be nominal, regular, or one-off donations, but given our precarious financial position, absolutely anything makes a huge difference to each and every one of the students and staff at AGS.



This year our focus turns to our extremely well used Student Support provision. We need to relocate and extend the space to another part of the School, freeing up much needed space in the Sixth Form Centre. It is an area frequently accessed by students needing a quiet and calm place away from the noisy school environment and it provides a crucial decompression and de-escalation area for some students, as well as supporting students with specific educational needs.

The value of education and strength of character required of the next generation has never been greater. With an evolving social and cultural landscape, young men have never been more challenged when finding their place in the world.

We are a hugely ambitious school, not only for our current students and staff, but also past and future students. This is reflected in our academic achievements but more so in the quality of students who walk out of our doors at the end of their education with us.

The struggle to know how to behave in society and questions around sense of identity brings into sharp focus the value of education. AGS provides the freedom to explore these issues and support our students to develop, in equal measure. Despite all of this, it may surprise you to learn that we are very poorly funded. We receive just £5,415 per year to educate your son (and significantly less for a Sixth Form student). You might say our Finance Team are doing a good job in managing our budget prudently, whilst still producing such incredible results, but it is not an easy feat, and it is not sustainable without incremental funding to maintain and improve our School for our future.

This is where our **Aylesburian Annual Fund** comes into play, **it feeds specific projects** which make a direct and immediate impact on our School community and future-proofs AGS for generations to come. Projects are varied and are determined by just how out of date the facilities are. In the past, they have included the refurbishment of our Maths department, IT Rooms, and more recently the complete refurbishment of Art, DT and Engineering. Capital projects have included a new Science Centre, new Library and new Sixth Form Centre. The Fund also supports our Financial Assistance provision which helps families who are unable to finance certain School activities.

We hope you can see the benefits of this fund and how the projects they facilitate are an integral part of our fantastic heritage. We really hope that you choose to be part of these legacy projects in some way.

We have been nurturing character since 1598 and will continue to do so for many years to come, inspiring and enabling our students to flourish throughout their lives.


# Local Geology

Mr Jones (Head of Geology) continues his series of local places of Geological interest, to assist in any of your wintery walks over this festive period...

#### Whitchurch

**Location:** Aylesbury HP22 4JU **Coordinates:** 51.880002, -0.836332

The rocks that lie beneath Whitchurch belong to two eras. The first under tropical seas and the second under ice! The first era is the Jurassic and the rocks are called the Portland and the Purbeck beds. These rocks are limestones and sandstones which were laid down under a tropical climate. The oldest are the Portland Beds and these underlie the southern part of the village – exactly underneath the line of the A413 and the land just either side of the road. There is more of this rock eastwards from the road – it stretches out beneath St John's church and almost out to Beechmoor Farm



### Key:

Pink colour patches = glacial sands

Pale blue patches = Till (glacial deposit)

WhS = Whitchurch Sandstone

Pb = Purbeck

PIS/PISt = Portland Sand/Stone

KC = Kimmeridge Clay


#### Limestone

The Portland beds were laid down in a warm, shallow tropical sea about 150 million years ago. Evidence for this is the limestone itself and also fossils such as ammonites

The Purbeck beds are to be found at the northern end of the village – at the roundabout and Market Hill and the Castle end. These rocks were laid down in nearshore and freshwater environments around 145 million years ago during a time when sea-level was falling and the area was about to emerge as land. The Whitchurch Sands lie over the Purbeck and are found northwest of the village, from just NW of the Castle to Oving. These deep red sandstones were laid down in rivers that criss-crossed the newly formed land 140 million years ago and you can see them in building stones in surrounding villages.

#### **Glacial Till**

Till is a clay with many sizes and types of pebbles and it is deposited beneath the moving ice. The ice plucks up rocks and pulverises them leaving behind a mix of clay to boulder size fragments on the frozen ground it passes over. Till is present to the SE of the village, around Beechmoor Farm, and either side of the Whitchurch to Oving road. This is where sands and gravels are found too – possibly formed from outwash from the retreating ice.



#### The route:

Takes 1 hour (without stops) c. 2 miles leisurely pace; flat ground; 3 stiles to cross.

Depending where you park, or what your preference is, this walk can start at any point.

#### St John's Church

A church has been on this site since the 10th century and this church dates from the 13th to 15th century. It is built from Portland Limestone – mostly the local kind, but spot the newer repairs which are made from Portland stone from Dorset.




### **The Old Brick Pits**

This is the location of an important industry throughout the Victorian period to recent times. The clay extraction here ceased in 1928 and it is now left for wildlife. On the high street in Whitchurch you will notice The Deerstalkers Antique Shop. Note the herringbone brickwork on this building. Brick-making and extracting the clay for bricks, was a big industry until recently. Now almost all the clay pits in the County, including the one in Whitchurch, are closed down. This building makes an attractive use of this local commodity and this one shop was originally three cottages.

#### **Spring Cottage**

This cottage is aptly named as it is next to Whittle Hole Spring. This was an important water source for the village. There are several springs around Whitchurch and their presence was no doubt a strong influence as to why the village was set up here, water being so essential to settlement. The spring marks the junction of the permeable Portland rocks with the Kimmeridge Clay underneath. Rainwater seeps into the Portland limestone and sandstones until it hits the impermeable clay. It will then run along the boundary until the impermeable horizon reaches a hillside or slope where the water will emerge as a spring.



In fact, taking a walk to the west of Whitchurch reveals a number of springs in this area. On the Ordnance Survey map below you can see a number of springs which have been circled. Joining these springs together highlights the boundary between the permeable sandstone and the impermeable clay below.

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
