Eco-Schools Green Flag Award 2022

We are pleased to report that we have secured our first ever Green Flag award as part of the Eco-Schools network. Not only is this the culmination of a year-long specific application process for the award, but in general the Eco-Team and its various offshoot have been coordinating projects in school for much longer.

Our garden projects were of particular interest to the Eco-Schools assessors – How we have turned little used pieces of waste ground on our already small site into purposeful areas and how the students have been involved in the planning, building and now maintaining of these sites.

Improvements to our site with initiatives such as mixed recycling bins, spent battery collections, book swap recycling box and global citizenship work such as our charity work in Malawi all led us to our successful Green Flag application for 2022.

We now look forward to progressing further, maintaining and enhancing our Green Flag status and coordinating a new whole-school environmental strategy to ensure our school is as energy efficient and future proof as it can be.







House Competitions 2022

The first complete House programme since 2019 saw keenly fought contests across both trophies throughout the year. Going into the final event of the Brodie trophy (House Athletics) it was a two-horse race between Hampden and Lee.

Hampden won the event and so took home Brodie gold in the overall standings too. A fantastic achievement for Hampden and Mr McGill especially since this is Hampden's first Brodie win since 1998. A dawn of a new era perhaps?

In the Watson trophy it was even tighter as the final few events came to their conclusion. Realistically it was always looking like the winners would come from Phillips, Paterson or Hampden. Ultimately, in similar dramatic fashion and against the historical run of play as with the Brodie competition it was Phillips House who emerged on top by just half a point!

Phillips hadn't lifted the Watson trophy since 2006 – needless to say Mr Goodchild and all the Phillips family were ecstatic with the win and have proved to themselves that they are a more than capable force and perhaps they may now be able to put 'a run together' as they say.

Uniform update

Please take note of this significant uniform update for September. This information has previously been emailed directly to all parents/carers and students and is available in the parents' section of the school website:



UNIFORM - FOOTWEAR GUIDANCE

All students Years 7 - 13

School shoes must be plain black and able to be polished (no suede), with no motifs, logos, coloured stitching or reflective areas. Laces should also be plain black.

Please note that black trainers or any kind of canvas shoes are not permitted as uniform shoes; this includes plimsole or Converse-style shoes, in either leather or fabric. Boots are not permitted at all in Years 7-11. Some boot styles are permitted in Years 12/13 – Chelsea boot style or similar close fitting ankle boots as long as they are plain black and able to be polished.

If parents/carers or students are uncertain about any aspect of school footwear they are advised to contact the school before purchasing.

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Year 8 at the Olympic Park


